# **Abounding in Hope**

Millions of God-fearing Christians are very angry at the laws, iournalism and media in our nation. The grim reality is that this scheme is meant to take masses of people away from God. It is a long-term, deranged plot toward globalism. Further, this one-world agenda simply reflects the soul of the old guard called Washington Elite.

God renewed their HOPE by reminding them of His faithfulness and promises originally made to Abraham [Isaac, Jacob]. We, too, need to proclaim that God is faithful: that Christ will never leave us nor forsake us!

HOPE is a message we must bring to the pulpit every time we minister God's Word! Every round table discussion or classroom situation must abound with HOPE. Paul wrote an encouraging praver for those he cared so much about at Rome. He prayed (Rom. 15:13). "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that vou may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Spirit." God would not have us possess just a little hope. No, He wants us to ABOUND in hope. So, what is hope? Gifted Bible teacher Derek Prince writes, hope is the "constant, unwavering expectation of good."

Second: Provide clear di**rection.** Keep in mind the circumstances that were present at the time of our text. People were troubled. Government was overreaching personal rights. The national attitude was depressing. Something positive needed to be spoken. Liberty had to be fought for.

### SPRING: A Season to Fix Issues

Sunday School Class for the ladies: Lord, what would You have me teach? I was praying about what God wanted me to communicate for my next Sunday School topic. I drew in a breath of spring air and as I exhaled, I planned on saying aloud the word "spring." Instead, what came out of my mouth was the word "issues." What a weird word to mix up. I thought. Then I felt the Holv Spirit sav. "That's your answer! SPRING IS A SEASON TO FIX ISSUES."

It is true; during the change of season, spring often reveals issues that need addressing. In the natural sense, roads and structures need to be repaired;



spring cleaning takes place in homes; yards need to be raked; and as the snow melts (at least here in the northland), a myriad of other problems are revealed that demand attention.

In the spiritual sense, there is a real need for us to address issues of the heart. God whole-heartedly advises us: "Keep (guard, tend, protect) your heart with all diligence, for out of it spring the issues of life" (Prov. 4:23, NKJV). Home and work projects require regular attention, but how much more important is it to address issues of the heart? The Bible says that everything else in our lives is affected by what "springs forth" from the heart. Certainly, we should take inventory of what is in our hearts! Let's take a moment and consider some of the possible issues that could be lying unchecked in our hearts.

The first is UNBELIEF. This is the state of harboring skepticism about God's Word. When Jesus was in Nazareth, His hometown, it is stated in Matthew 13:58 that Jesus did not do many mighty works there because of their UNBELIEF. Did you know that unbelief can hinder miracles from taking place? Even if Jesus has a home in your heart. He may be limited in what He can do in your life if unbelief is also a resident.

Another issue to beware of is DOUBT. Doubt is the feeling of uncertainty about the truth, reality, or nature of something. When we hesitate to believe God or are uncertain about what He says, be on the lookout for DOUBT. Doubt will cause you to second guess everything – everything you know to be true, everything that God says about who you are or who He is. Doubt is the enemy Adam and Eve succumbed to in the garden of Eden when the serpent caused them to second guess God's clear command.

FEAR is an ever-so-common issue that rears its head every chance it gets. It is an extremely distressing emotion evoked by impending danger, evil, or pain; whether the threat is real or imagined. Moses, the mighty delivered of the Israelites, was influenced by FEAR on several occasions. The first time God told him to go and speak to Pharoah, he voiced his fears instead of responding in faith. If you find yourself saying to God, "I can't because of ..." or "But what if..." – these may be indicators of the presence of fear, and it certainly needs to be dealt with.

Another common problem of the heart is INSE-CURITY. This can manifest in many different ways, often causing someone to overcompensate in another area. This throws them "off balance" and causes instability in life. Insecurity is lack of confidence or assurance. The secret to maintaining confidence, is to not place it in human beings, but to place one's confidence in God. He alone is our secure ROCK. "Do not be afraid of sudden terror... For the Lord will be your confidence..." (Prov. 3:25-26).

Sometimes we have WOUNDS in our hearts. We may have endured injury, pain, damage, or offense done to our hearts by others. Have you ever lashed out about something or been over-protective in an area of your life? It is wise to consider the possibility that you are protecting a wound. No matter the source of the injury or with whom the blame lies, we ultimately have to take responsibility to obtain healing. Isaiah 53:5 displays the beautiful picture of Christ enduring wounds, pain, and punishment so we



could obtain healing. There is no wound so great that Jesus can't mend. God heals the broken-hearted (injuries to the soul), and carefully wraps our wounds (Psalm 147:3).

You may wonder if you really need to address issues of the heart. How dangerous can invisible issues be? Truth is, there is danger in allowing problems to continue unaddressed. What can happen if we ignore heart-issues?

- They can grow;
- They can cause further damage;
- They can lead to other problems:
- They can cost more time and effort to fix later:
- You cannot be made "whole" (complete, perfect) until the repairs are made.

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
