lished the principles and beliefs that became the Constitution of the United States.

# Celebrating the 4th of July!

Most people realize that the above verse is etched on the famous Liberty Bell in Philadelphia, PA. That same bell was originally cast in the Whitechapel Foundry in London, England. It was later hung in the Pennsylvania State House in 1753; the building is presently known as Independence Hall. The Liberty Bell cracked, upon the first attempt to ring it. So, other than a few occasions, it has never been rung since. However, though the physical bell has been silent for over two hundred years, the Bible verse and the liberty people have experienced still rings loud and clear.

Today and through the 4th of July, people across America will

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Independence Day. We shall reconsider the glorious freedom we cherish here. Picnics, fireworks, parades, and the like accompany

popular U.S. Holiday. It is good time for believers to pause and thank the Lord for Christian influence on this great nation. Thank God for the tremendous blessings He has bestowed upon America.

July 4th prompts thinking for a deeper kind of liberty, i.e. Freedom in Christ! The Old Testament (OT) made it clear that liberty and escaping bondage is something to celebrate. Leviticus 25 mentions JUBILEE numerous times. People in the OT celebrated freedom every fifty years. Further, we find in the New Testament (NT) the greatest liberty of all; forgiveness of sins and new life in Christ!

Jesus spoke about liberty in His teachings. John Chapter 8 reveals how He wants to set people free from spiritual bondage (sin). He said:

- Whoever commits sin is the servant of sin:
- □ Whom the Son sets free is free indeed!

# **FOUR Freedoms of America and** the FIFTH Freedom for Christians

On January 6, 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt delivered a speech titled "Four Freedoms." In his speech, he declared that every American should have four basic freedoms:

- ☐ Freedom of Speech,
- ☐ Freedom of Religion,
- ☐ Freedom of Want,
- ☐ Freedom from Fear.

In 1943, Norman Rockwell illustrated these four freedoms in a painting titled "OURS....to fight



born to us.

Hebrews 10:16 (NLT) reads: "This is the new covenant I will make with My people on that day. says the Lord: I will put My laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds."

While the covenant that has been put in place is irrevocable, and ours as an inheritance. there is a response required from us. Paul writes in Galatians 5:16-17 (NLT): "So I say, let the Holv Spirit quide vour lives. Then you won't be doing what your sinful nature craves. The sinful nature wants to do evil, which is just the opposite of what the Spirit wants. And the Spirit gives us desires that are the opposite of what the sinful nature desires. These two forces are constantly fighting each

other, so you are not free

to carry out your good intentions."

By this passage we understand that this fifth freedom, in the words of Norman Rockwell, is "Ours, to fight for." The Apostle Paul makes it clear that there are two forces within each of us: the spirit and the sinful nature. These two forces are constantly fighting each other. When we yield to the Spirit, we are not under obligation to the Law of Moses.

In Galatians 5:24 (NLT), Paul declares the final act that grants us this fifth freedom: "Those who belong to Christ Jesus have nailed



the passions and desires of their sinful nature to His cross and crucified them there."

The Apostle John understood the great joy that crucifying our sinful nature to the cross of Christ would bring when he declared in John 8:36 (NLT): "So if the Son sets you free, you are truly free."



The first four freedoms (we enjoy in the USA) require vigilance and maintenance to ensure that they are preserved. Much more importantly, however, is the need to be empowered by the Holy Spirit. The fifth freedom crucifies the sinful nature through the cross. This is ours to

There is, however, a fifth freedom available to every believer: Freedom from the sinful nature. When Christ declared on the cross, "It is finished!" a new covenant was set in place. This new covenant included the promise that the Holy Spirit would enter into our lives and empower us to overcome that sinful nature

"fight for."
