It's Still Your Choice By Alton Dan Smith

At a definitive moment of faith in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, people make a decision to become His disciples. Thus, we embark on the most memorable and life-changing adventure beyond our imagination.

This new life, however, is not totally substantiated by a single decision. The "new born" experience is replete with other spiritual intersections where, as we stand at these crossroads, our will must be repeatedly exercised. We must continue to grow from this initial life changing encounter into the stature of Christ's behavior and the maturity of Christian living. Some of the most critical and challenging moments in this journey of growth will require the exercise of a conscious volition.

As spiritual growth becomes paramount in the life of the new believer, it is in a "growing environment" that we are nurtured to become all that Christ intends for us to be. This environment is not exclusively an innate process. Neither does it come by osmosis. Rather, it is realized by applying certain principles that effect this development. These fundamentals must be put in motion by specific choices of the heart.

It is not possible to become an

automobile by living in a garage. Neither is spiritual maturity gained by merely associating with a church and its various functions. Privately, we must decide and desire for the continuous regenerative power of the Holy Spirit and the Word of God to produce new spiritual cells within us. Wise men check out the foundation upon which a building is constructed (I Cor. 3:11). Thus far, we have considered that in order for one to function well and wisely build upon our organizational base, we must know the DNA. We have considered IMA's emphasis of the

empowering and passion to promote missions.



Today, we shall discover a wellfounded virtue called respecting a fellow minister's personal beliefs, even when they differ from our own. Of course, we are not speaking of stalwart Biblical doctrines, but rather one's personal perspective on the finer points of the Christian faith. This particular merit of the IMA is why we are a successful ministerial fellowship.

The spirit of IMA founders and original members was one that fostered an attitude of respect. The word RESPECT comes from an old French word that meant to [have a] "relationship, regard or consideration" for another person. Further, when translated into Latin (and later English), it carried the idea to look back and reconsider. Literally, it meant to (re), again and (spek), to observe. Respect is the "feeling of esteem excited by attitudes of another." Scripture uses this word in both Old and New Testaments.



The IMA captured "respect" as a founding value; it is part of our DNA.

I've personally witnessed IMA

table talk and official business transacted through respect for others. Politics has lost it: education is searching for it; business has cashed in on it; families have tossed it to the wind; gospel ministers must embrace RESPECT! I've heard things said like: "we can differ on minor doctrines, as long as we respect each other's pulpits" and "the IMA has room for brethren who differ in opinions, such as the how-to's of applying our faith."

I saw one seasoned IMA minister stand behind two ministers that were struggling in a relational issue. They had not spoken to one another for a long time. The minister said, "You brothers need to talk." He and some others then exited the room and from a distance. I watched those two IMA comrades talk, express differences, soften their hearts, repent and pray for each other. As a younger minister seeing this play out, I was so impressed with the respect virtue of the IMA. Brothers of difference were re-bonded because of respect.

May 1958 issue of the Herald of *Truth* features a copy of a letter on IMA letterhead that endorsed the "Five-Fold Ministry." At that time, there was a movement that God would restore all gifts, including apostles and prophets to the church (Eph. 4:11-12). Their reason for making this bold move was based on respect as they quoted what was stated in the [IMA] Constitution: "Differences of opinion on doctrine shall not be a barrier to membership as long as there is no contention and the pulpits and churches of others are respected..."
